
Our work on behalf of vulnerable families and children in the Sisters community is more important than ever during this time of change. I hope that as you read

Mentor Spotlight ...


I fell in love...



Program Spotlight...

Crystal Peaks Youth Ranch has partnered with Circle of Friends for over 5 years. It is on this once abandoned property that new life and new hope springs out of the cinder foundation. Circle of Friends mentees' are able to freely access all the services offered by Crystal Peaks. Single most important factor in building resiliency in vulnerable youth is a long-term, consistent relationship with a caring adult.



Number of Current Mentors

Mentors receive 12 hours of training and ongoing monthly support to provide skilled & professional services to our youth

In Six Years:

- 3 Mentors have volunteered more than 5 years
- 18 Mentors have volunteered more than 3 years
- 23 Mentors have volunteered more than 2 years



The Need:

- 42% of Children in Sisters Schools live in economically disadvantaged families.
- 100% of Children served have experienced a traumatic life experience.

Children Served:

- 20 Live in single parent homes
- · 8 have had a critical life event
- 7 live with guardians other than a biological parent



WHATS THE BIG DEAL - WHY LEGO ROBOTICS

Robotics is Tangible

Today's young people are immersed in technology, most of that technology is intangible and difficult to conceptualize. Mentees can **connect** with robotics quickly because they are able to touch the robots and manipulate them directly.

Robotics Builds Confidence

By building with robots, mentees are able to **create** their own devices and gadgets that **interact** with the world. This is a **profound** and **empowering** experience, which greatly impacts mentees and instills technological competence.

Robotics is Fun

At Lego Robotics Workshops mentees learn to see robotics as a **fun** hobby rather than as a strictly educational activity. Because of this, mentees are willing to **engage** deeply and creatively with the challenges and activities they are given. In a way, these mentees come away with a **love of learning** because they have realized that they need to learn the concepts we teach in order to build the robots that they imagine.

Robotics is Creative

Traditional Lego sets come with handy instruction manuals. These instruction manuals help set the ground work for Mentees to build skill and trust and increase their confidence. The goal is for mentees to learn to set aside the instruction manuals. Eventually, mentees learn that their own imaginations are the most powerful 'instruction manuals' ever to exist.
